***Borealis Race* by Kara Kellar Bell**

The Book

A sweeping, compelling narrative, brilliantly plotted, of dark family secrets which switches between Glasgow and Berlin, and between the 1920s and 30s and the present day.

Brief Description

Film historian Laura is writing a biography of the brilliant Barry family of Glasgow. All achieved fame in their day; sisters Christabel and Iris Stuart were gifted artists and contemporaries of Charles Rennie Mackintosh, Christabel married pioneer film-maker Frank Barry, and their children were society photographer Alex, painter Rose, and Eva who became a celebrated silent movie star in 1920s Germany. Eva's career was tragically cut short when she was assassinated in a Berlin street, and her murderer never found.

Her research almost complete, Laura becomes increasingly fascinated by Eva, and tracks down her few remaining relatives and contemporaries to nursing homes. Through interviews, letters and diary entries, Laura is able to piece together much of Eva's final year, and, alongside the glamorous world of the movie industry, a disturbing and vivid portrait of Berlin society emerges, of jealousies, sexual intrigue, family disputes, and the rising power of Nazism. Her research leads her to a sinister French collector of Eva's films and memorabilia, and Laura realises that she has unwittingly allowed the collector access to all her contacts. Back in Glasgow she realises she's being followed, her phone is tapped and her flat broken into. Someone is trying to prevent her from completing her research. She travels to Berlin to interview a contemporary of Eva's who may hold the missing piece in the jigsaw. The truth about Eva's last year, and the mystery surrounding her death, is far stranger than Laura has bargained for, and she is left with the most difficult decision of her life.

The Author

The author is Kara Kellar Bell. She's in her early 40s, and is from Paisley. She studied Film and Media at Stirling University.

Then, on the other side of the city, another major supplier is murdered and it becomes apparent this is no tit-for-tat killing but that someone is taking out the untouchables. The police make the inevitable statements about not allowing such killings to go unpunished - how they won't stand for vigilantism on the city's streets - but the truth is they're not unhappy at seeing the demise of men they themselves could not stop.

When a third drug lord is killed, the unknown vigilante gains hero status in the media and everyone's morals are stretched to breaking point. Only one cop, detective sergeant John Craith, seems hell-bent on finding the killer. The question his fellow officers are asking is - why is he so determined?

Brief Description

At the outset of World War II, Jack and Sadie Rosenblum escape Berlin, bound for London. Disembarking in England, a pamphlet is placed in Jack's hands. Written by the British Jewish Aid Committee, it details how to act like 'the English'. Jack follows it to the letter ... it's his way to assimilate.

In time Jack begins to compile his own amendments and additions – his 'list'. An Englishman must get his suits hand made in Saville Row, he must drive a Bentley and he must become a member of a golf club.

But when Jack is rebuffed from every golf club in London he determines to build his own course. He moves an unwilling and depressive Sadie to rural Dorset and so begins a quixotic adventure ... amongst myths of woolly pigs, magical cider and the turning of the seasons.

The Author

Natasha Solomons is a 28-year-old screenwriter – working with her co-writer and husband, David Solomons. They have - in development with Material Entertainment (Producers of 'Run, Fatboy, Run) - an adaptation of Jane Austen's *Lady Susan*. She is also developing an original screenplay set in the world of ballet as well as a high school comedy with Synchronicity Pictures. She and David live in Dorset. This is her first novel.

***The Secret Mandarin* by Sara Sheridan**

The Book

A sweeping tale of drama, passion and espionage set in China at time of Opium Wars.

Brief Description

Actress Mary Penney disgraces her respectable relations when she becomes pregnant. Her family's attempts to pack her off to India for a new life are thwarted when she fails to board her ship. Desperate to remove her from English society, Mary's brother in law forces her to accompany him on his voyage to China, outwardly a botanical expedition but Robert is also working as a spy for the East India Company. On board he refuses to speak to her for the first month, and Mary is left alone to come to terms with her plight. The mission is difficult and dangerous - the novel is set at the time of the first Opium War, the British are regarded as enemies, and the export of tea bushes banned. Robert and Mary disguise themselves as a mandarin and man-servant, and Mary's eyes are opened by the journey- she learns about plants, becomes fluent in Cantonese, empathises with the plight of Chinese peasants, and revels in the freedom afforded by her male identity. As the voyage continues into remote territory, so Robert and Mary's relationship changes from antipathy to respect, and from friendship to love.

The Author

Sara Sheridan has based the adventure on the historical figure of plant collector Robert Fortune who did travel to the Far East, but the story is fiction. Sara's books include *Truth or Dare* (Arrow) 1998 ; *Ma Polinski's Pockets* (Arrow) 1999 and *The Pleasure Express* (Arrow) 2001. She has also ghost written for Mia Dolan and Judy Westwater (Harper Element). She lives in Edinburgh and is now working on her second historical novel, *The Arabian Knight*, to be published by Avon in 2010.

The Book

Drawing on a wide framework of cultural and spiritual reference, this is an extraordinary and ambitious novel with a visceral sensuality and subtle touches of magical realism, in the vein of Okri, Murakami and Pamuk.

Brief Description

Recently-bereaved Zuleikha MacBeth wades into the River Clyde one morning and recovers a large box, with which she becomes obsessed. The discovery of the box brings her together with Alex, a lute-playing clerk, and they manage to open the box – only to find six further boxes inside which they can only open once they have followed cryptic clues.

The clues lead Zulie and Alex on a physical and emotional journey modulated through music across Glasgow, Argyllshire, Lincolnshire, Sicily, Lahore, and finally the frozen peaks of the 'Roof of the World'. Zulie, a troubled doctor, finds herself sucked into the vortex of the terminally ill Archie MacPherson, an ambivalent, visionary ex-WW2 airman and Glasgow shipyard worker. In the manner of a lord of misrule, Archie's dying consciousness begins to shape and ultimately define Zuleikha and Alex's quest as they progress through the seven Sufi stations of sacrifice, truth, power, obedience, life, memory and beauty.

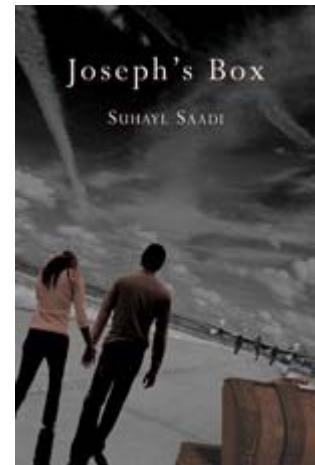
The Author

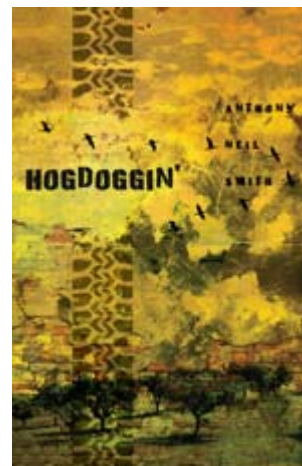

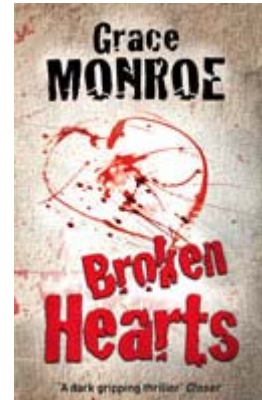

Brief Description

In Edinburgh a man's corpse is found with an overdose of heroin and missing his heart. The murder and its expertly removed organ allows reporters and police to resurrect the name of one of the country's most renowned killers – Romeo. 20 years ago, this twisted modus operandus was identical to that performed by Brendan Fallon and Renee Richardson, two ten year olds found guilty of kidnap, murder and mutilation.
